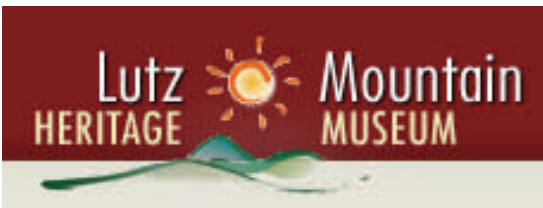

Built in 1883, the Lutz Mountain Meeting House was known as the "Second Baptist Church" of Moncton, and since 1975 has served as Lutz Mountain's community Heritage Museum. Artefacts tell as much about people as the written word. Step into the past as you enjoy displays of garments, quilts, household implements, tools, even a school room – proud memories of a bygone era. If you are interested in family research, we have census, marriage, cemetery and genealogy records from 1770 to 1901, as well as local stories and newspaper clippings.

An Exciting New Restructuring of The Bonar Law Site



With its new logo the site has been re-branded and now is so much more than you can imagine. Based on the past community use of this site and the new restructuring this site has been recently named “Bonar Law Common”.

As an addition to the heritage value of the Bonar Law Common, celebrating the life of Andrew Bonar Law, a “walk through time” telling the story of life on the Richibucto River has been developed. Take a stroll through our “walk through time” (see below) and enjoy learning about the regions past. Don’t rush, sit in the shade and enjoy the scenery and lovely summer breeze coming off the grand old Richibucto River. The Bonar Law Common has a new festival area, which will include a new band shelter, vender booths,

children’s play area and new parking sections.

With the new development, the Common now hosts a new games area, highlighted with the new exciting games of Farmersgolf and Extreme Croquet, along with other fun filled games for the whole family. While many new activities such as Saturday Morning at the Common and Sunday Night Classics will be taking place, favourite events such as British Car Days of New Brunswick and local favourites like Canada Day and New Brunswick celebrations will be continuing.

The Bonar Law Common now offers space for business and local groups or organizations to rent the site for various events or gatherings. Check out rental options, we feel you will be pleasantly surprised. It has been stated by tourism industry leaders “the Bonar Law Common” could become a top major tourism draw for the region”.

Part of the restructuring of the Bonar law Common is the development of a “Walk through time”. This trail will wind its way from the Interpretative / Welcome Centre towards Bonar Law’s homestead, alongside the farm garden, follow the shoreline, through the old apple orchard and ending in the court yard of Bonar’s former home. This will make for a very pleasant stroll. All along your walk, you can gather information on the region’s past and wonder back in time as to what it would have been like living on the banks of the Richibucto River in days gone by.

The trail itself is completed, but we are still working on documenting and constructing the interpretative panels. We hope this portion of the Bonar Law Common restructuring will soon be completed.

A New Perspective: The Origins of New Brunswick's Free Baptists

New Book Available

A new book by Michael Christie and Robert McCormick provides an in-depth description of the rise of the Free Baptists in New Brunswick from their beginnings in the late 1700s to 1850 shortly after the New Brunswick Free Christian Baptist Conference was organized and a union with the Nova Scotia Free Christian Baptists was arranged. It includes descriptions of (a) the origins and development of the Newlights or free gospel people by the late 1810s, (b) the American missionary probes (Free Will Baptists and Christian Connection) beginning in the 1820s, (c) the creation of the New Brunswick Christian Conference in 1832, (d) the tumultuous intrigues and changes in this Christian Conference caused by the different "Christian" groups in the 1830s, (e) the Disciples of Christ (Campbellite) presence, (f) the role of Elder Jonathan Hamilton from Maine in the 1840s, and (g) the break with American religious influences and the emergence of the Free Christian Baptists in 1847. Not a theological study, the book accurately reports for the first time the complex development of this free gospel denomination through all its growing pains. These chapters might be considered a new history, an excavation at a deeper level where some surprising discoveries have been made. Also presented is considerable new information about early ministers from New Brunswick and New England long since forgotten. The material for this book was obtained upon an exhaustive examination of original sources including contemporary New Brunswick Free Baptist publications, church record books, numerous religious journals and newspapers, unpublished information (extracted from family papers, minister's journals, private diaries, and personal letters), printed biographies, and several town histories.

Thomas Williams House

Built in 1883 by prominent Monctonian Thomas Williams, treasurer with the Intercolonial Railway, this heritage home stands as an elegant symbol of local life during the Victorian era. Thomas Williams and his wife, Analena, purchased the property beyond town limits in 1882 and built their impressive house the following year to serve as a home for their rapidly growing family. Six of their 11 children were later born in the house, which remained a private dwelling for the Williams' descendants until 1983. The 12-room house is a fine example of Second Empire architectural style. A large, screened verandah extends from the main entrance across the front of the house and wraps around the side. Today, the Thomas Williams House is a designated municipal heritage site located at 103 Park Street in Moncton.

Holocaust Memorial Day (Yom Hashoah) Observance

SHAAREI ZEDEK SYNAGOGUE, 91 LEINSTER STREET, SAINT JOHN, N.B.

The programme will feature a keynote address by Alex Eisen, a Holocaust survivor now living in Toronto. He was born in Vienna, Austria in 1929 and at nine years of age watched the Nazis march into Vienna. Soon after Eisen, his parents and two sisters escaped to Hungary. His father was arrested at the border but managed to flee from there to Palestine. When Hungary came under Nazi occupation in 1944 his older sister was deported to Auschwitz. Eisen, his mother and younger sister remained in the Budapest ghetto until they were able to escape, and posing as Christians, managed to survive until liberation in January 1945. Following liberation Eisen was determined to join his father in Palestine and in 1947 boarded an illegal ship, the Theodore Herzl, carrying refugees to Palestine. The ship was seized by the British and the refugees were sent to a detention camp in Cyprus. There, Eisen was reunited with his mother and sisters who were also waiting to be allowed entry to Palestine. Once he reached Palestine in the fall of 1947, he joined the Israeli underground (Haganah) and later the Israeli army fighting in the battle of Jerusalem. He was transferred to the Israeli Air Force where he met his wife, Renata Markovic, also a Holocaust survivor. They married in 1951 and immigrated to Canada the following year. They have two children and five grandchildren, all of whom live in Toronto. At age 75 Eisen became involved in Holocaust education and he has recently written his memoirs.

The annual Beatrice Cummings Mayer Prizes will be presented to high school students who participated in the Jewish Holocaust Study Group, jointly organized by the Saint John Jewish Historical Museum and the District 8 Enrichment Centre.. The students' work will be available for viewing in the Museum before and after the program.

Candles will be lit in memory of those who were killed during the Holocaust.

A reception will follow the presentation.
